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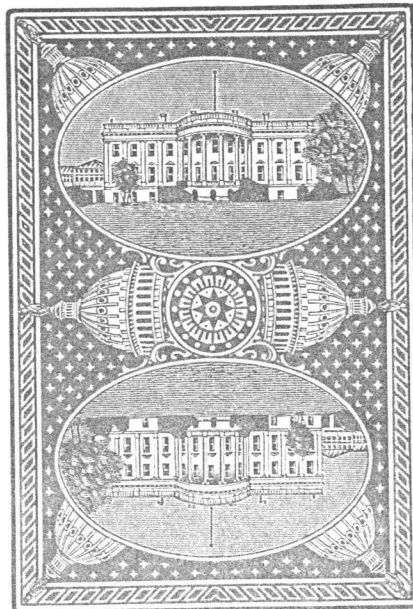
The pack consists of twenty-two pairs of cards, representing the Presidents of the United States and their administrations.

Deal five cards to each player and lay the surplus pack in the center of the table, face downward.

Before beginning to play, each player should sort out all pairs held in his hand, and lay them to one side, to be scored at end of game.

The player at the left of the dealer then begins to play by calling from any other player for a card needed to complete a pair (one card of which he holds in his hand). If the player called upon has the card called for, he announces "I have it." The caller must then, if he desires the first card of the pair (marked "A"), quote the name of the President on the card he desires, the date of his administration, and his politics. In case he desires the second card of the pair (marked "B"), he must quote the President's name and one historical event of his administration.

As the players grow familiar with the game and the events contained in it, the caller may be required, in the first case, to give the date of birth and death of the President, and in the last case, to quote two, three or more historical events. It is not necessary to quote these historical
