Games For Children Of All Ages

**Story Telling Game For
Young Children**

There's lots of fun and action for adults and children in telling a story this new way. First, put all cards in each story in proper sequence and starting with No. 1, read each card to the child and place it on the table in front of him. As you do this, the child's attention is focused directly on each scene and as you continue, the sequence of the story action becomes strongly impressed on his mind. After it is completed, the entire picture pattern of the story will be laid out in front of the child for his attention. Then, mix all of the cards together and ask the child to first separate each story and then try to put the cards together in their proper order as he would a jig-saw puzzle. Eventually, the child will be able to read the story back to you from just looking at the pictures on each card.

Games For Older Children

I. LUCKY-SEVENS

Game can be played by three or more players. Cards are first dealt out to all. The player to the left of the dealer is the first to go. If he has a No. 7 of any Story in his hand he must lay it on the table. If the following player has the next number of the same Story in his hand, up or down, he must follow suit and lay it out next to the card; or, if he has a No. 7 in his hand of another Story, he can lay that out instead. Each player must then follow suit the

same way. If he has no card to lay out, he "passes" and the game continues until one player is out of cards. He is the winner and receives as his score the total of all the numbers left in the other player's hands.

2. RALLY-UP

Game for three players. First the cards are shuffled and dealt out to the players so each is holding 12 cards in his hand. Then as one player cries "Rally" each player takes 2 cards from his hand and passes it, face down, to the player at his left. This continues until one player shows a complete story of 12 consecutive cards in his hand.

3. STORY-RUMMY

Children can also play Rummy by considering each story illustrated as an individual suit and combining the numbers of each. For example . . . a winning hand may consist of the numbers 7, 8, 9 of one Story and 1, 2, 3, 4 of another Story, etc.

4. SNIP AND SNAP

In this game the deck is divided equally between two or more players, each placing his stack in front of him, face down. The players then take turns exposing one card at a time from their stacks calling out the word "snip." If one player turns up a number matching the number on his opponent's card which is face up, he then says "snap" and takes all of his opponent's exposed cards placing them on top of his own pack. When all cards in a pack are face up, the player turns the cards picture side down again and the game continues until one player has "snapped" all the cards.
