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## **Which, What, or Where?**

### **A Geography Game**

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This is a game especially intended for use by children in the Fourth and Fifth Grades of school work, and in the Home.

The game is played with a pack of 36 cards, numbered from 1 to 36, each card having, on one side, a numbered map showing some body of land or water on the earth's surface, and on the other side a different number and five questions which can be correctly answered by a name printed in heavy type with a star before it on the map bearing the same number as the questions.

*The numbered maps are as follows:—*

The card having on one side Map No. 1 has on the other side the number 36 and the questions which are correctly answered by the name printed in heavy type with a star before it on Map No. 36. The card having Map No. 2 has on the other side the number 35 and the questions which are

correctly answered by the name printed in heavy type with a star before it on Map No. 35 and so on throughout the series, the card with Map No. 36 having, on the other side, the number 1, and the questions which are correctly answered by the name printed in heavy type with a star before it on Map No. 1.

## **RULES FOR PLAYING THE GAME**

### **RULE NO. 1**

#### **FOR THREE OR MORE PLAYERS**

The cards are dealt equally among the players. A few minutes may be given for each player to read the questions on his cards, remembering that one name answers all of the questions on any one card. Each player then places his cards in a row on the table with the maps up, and by looking for a name in heavy type with a star before it decides the name of each map.

Player A, to the left of the dealer, begins by turning over any one of his cards and reading a question from it, player B, next in turn, gives an answer, and each player in turn, ending with

A, likewise gives an answer. A then calls out the number of the card and the player having the map of the same number calls out the correct answer. A then gives the turned up card to the first one of the players who had answered correctly, or, if no one has answered correctly, the card must be turned down to be used again. B now turns up a card and reads a question from it, to which C has the first answer and B the last, and the game continues in the same way as before.

Any player winning a card places it in an Honor row above the first row, but cannot use it in asking questions. The player who has the most Honor cards at the end of the game is the winner.

The game may be played for a certain length of time, or until all of the cards have been used and won.

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#### **RULE NO 2**

##### **FOR A SINGLE PLAYER**

Use only the question side of the cards. Take a card, read the first question and then

answer it, then look for the number of the card upon the printed list to prove the answer. If correct, the player has one card for the Honor row; if not, the card may be placed in another row for "Jack." The player wins if the Honor row has more cards than "Jack."

The game may be varied by taking a different question on each card, or by reading more than one before answering.

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#### **RULE NO 3**

##### **FOR AN UNEVEN NUMBER OF PLAYERS**

Use only the question side of card. Each player may draw a card, and the one drawing the card with the highest number may act as "Teacher" and may deal the cards, prove the answers by the printed list, and deliver the Honor cards to each side. The player holding the card with the next highest number may choose half of the players for one side, the others forming the second side. When the cards have been dealt, the first side asks a question to be answered by the other side. If the question is
