TO PLAY AS SOLITAIRE

- 1. Study the list of definitions and select one you'd like to start with. (Note that the figures in parentheses indicate the number of letters in the word.)
- 2. Decide upon the word which you think fits the definition. When you have thus "solved" the crossword, your next step will be to "assemble" the jigsaw. To do this, you must find the jigsaw pieces bearing the correct letters which will assemble in the correct direction.

For example: if definition number 4 <u>across</u> reads "The opposite of good (3)", you will have to find the "B", the "A", and the "D" which will interlock <u>horizontally</u> to form the word "BAD".

- 3. After you have assembled the word, peel off the appropriate sticky-backed number provided, and put it in the upper left hand corner of the first letter . . . In the example above, the number "4" would be put on the letter "B".
- 4. Note that you now know the first letter of definition number 4 down. Study the numbering of the definitions for additional clues. For example, if there is a definition "5" down, but no "5" across, then one of the letters in "4" across must also be the first letter of "5" down.

TO PLAY COMPETIVELY

(Any convenient number can play)

- 1. Read the rules for solitaire play as given above.
- 2. Choose a first player by any convenient method. The first player then has three minutes to assemble a word as outlined above. If he succeeds, score is awarded on the basis of one point for each letter in the word, and two points for each interlocking black piece.
- 3. Play then passes to the next player. He can attempt an independent assemblage, or he can add to an already formed group. In either case the method of scoring awards him one point for each letter in the word (even though some of the letters may have been counted previously.)
