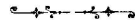

HISTORICAL GAME.



There are forty Blue Colored cards bearing questions relating to important events in the history of our country, and forty Peach cards bearing answers.

NOTE.—Shuffle the cards well and keep them face down until dealt.

1. Deal four cards to each player.

2. The player at the dealer's left hand begins by laying a card on the table. This card can only be taken by the one corresponding; for example, if the card laid down be, "What was the first battle of the Revolution?" the only card to take it would be "Battle of Lexington;" or if the card laid down was "Battle of Lexington," the card to take it would be "What was the first battle of the Revolution?"

3. If the next player holds the proper card, he will of course play it, and take the two and lay them aside. If he has not, he lays a card on the table just as the first did and the next player has two chances to take, and so on. When the first 4 cards have been used, the dealer will distribute four more to each player, continuing to do so, as the cards are played, until all the pack has been used.

4. If any player, by mistake, lays down a card which would take a card already on the table, any player who sees it can take it when his turn comes.

5. The player who, at the end of the game, has taken the greatest number of cards, wins.

In order to avoid mistakes, or to settle a difference of opinion, a list of the questions with their answers is appended.

Who was Aaron Burr and for what was he noted?

Vice President under Jefferson, noted for his supposed conspiracy against the Union, and duel with Hamilton.

What Presidents have served two terms?

Washington, Jefferson, Madison, Monroe, Jackson, Grant, Cleveland.

What did the Americans gain by the capture of Fort Ticonderoga?

Large stores of guns and ammunition.

What was the Missouri Compromise?

A bill prohibiting slavery West of the Mississippi River and north of parallel 36 deg. 30 min.

What victory did Washington gain on Christmas night, 1776?

Battle of Trenton.

What important event occurred July 4, 1776?

Declaration of Independence.

What Presidents died in office?

Harrison, Taylor, Lincoln, Garfield.

What great invention during Washington's administration?

Cotton gin, invented by Eli Whitney.

What father and son both held the presidency?

John Adams and John Quincy Adams.

What important commercial treaty took place in Pierce's administration?

Treaty with Japan.

When did the first steamer sail for Europe?

1819.

During Monroe's administration what purchase was made and from whom?

Florida from Spain.

What great event happened in 1620?

Landing of the Pilgrims at Plymouth, Mass.

What occurred June 17, 1775?

Battle of Bunker Hill.

During whose administration were the star route frauds exposed?

Curtis.

What two statesmen died in 1826?

John Adams and Thomas Jefferson.

Who first practised the principle of "To the victors belong the spoils"?

President Jackson.

Who surrendered to Washington at the capture of Yorktown?

Lord Cornwallis.
