

RULES FOR PLAYING WILD FLOWER GAME

Published by Parker Brothers, Salem, Mass., U. S. A.

The flowers illustrated in this game are those included in the Chautauqua Course of Botany.

The game has a tendency to familiarize the players with the names and appearance of these flowers in a very pleasing manner.

1. The game is played on the Authors principle, there being fifty-two cards divided in thirteen sets of four cards each.

2. Cards should be shuffled, and an equal share dealt to each player, after which each player should arrange all the flowers of the same family which he had in his hands together.

3. The object of a player holding one or more flowers of a family is to obtain the remaining flowers, as he who can during the game, lay aside the greatest number of complete sets, WINS.

4. The name of the card is the name prominently lettered under the family name. In calling use the name of one of the three flowers mentioned at the bottom of the card, which complete the four cards representing the family in question.

5. The player at the left of the dealer begins by calling upon another player for a card that will help him complete the set representing a family, any portion of which he holds. The player called upon gives up the flower called for if he has it. If the person calling obtains the card asked for of the person asked, he puts it in his own pack with his other cards of the same family, and continues calling for other cards from any of the players. The player calling loses his turn when he demands a card from a player who does not hold it.

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6. It then becomes the turn of his left hand neighbor to call, and so on in turn.

7. When a player obtains a complete set (that is the four cards representing a family) he lays it aside, to be counted at the end of the game.

8. When a player calls for a card which he already has, he forfeits it to the player from whom he calls it.

9. When all the cards have been formed into sets the game ends, and the player having the greatest number of sets is the Winner of the game.
