JIGGERIES.

Invented by Messrs. Peall & Williams.

Place all the small sections face down on the centre of table.

Each player has one copy picture and one frame. Each player in turn spins the Tetotum, & whatever number on the Tetotum settles on the table, that player draws the same number of sections from centre heap, he now looks at same, and retains what he thinks is necessary to form up a similar picture to his copy.

All pieces retained must be immediately placed in their frames, picture side up, if there are any over, these are returned to centre heap, face downwards.

The Tetotum is now passed to the second player,

who proceeds in a like manner.

When selecting pieces from the centre heap do not allow your opponents to see what you have taken, with of course the exception of those you retain.

Each player must place his frame straight in front of him, in view of the other players.

Should a player retain a piece that does not belong to him, same must be given up to any player who can prove that it is part of picture he is forming.

The player first completing his picture is the

winner.

A longer and better game can be played as follows-1st player to complete picture scores 10-2nd player 7—3rd player 4 (no score for the last player). All players now pass their copy pictures on to the player on their left, sections shuffled and replaced on centre of table, and game proceeds as at first, this continues until each player has completed all four pictures.

The winner is the player who has scored the

most points in the four rounds.
