TWELVE MEN MORRICE.

Directions are pasted on the back of the board, but for greater convenience, full particulars are given here: Black usually leads the first game, red the second, and so on, alternately. In placing the men strive to make rows for yourself and at the same time stop rows of your opponent. When you have three of your men in a row along any line on the board, you take off one of the other men, but you must not take one out of a row unless all his men are in rows, when your opponent must choose one of them for you to take.

After the men have all been placed on the board, moving begins. Sometimes no rows are made in placing the men. Then every position is occupied, and an opening must be made by letting the player whose turn it is to move take a man chosen by the other player. You can move in all directions, but only along the lines from one hole to the next. It is bad playing to move one of your men out of a row unless you can surely move it back again before the other makes a row. Try to get two of your rows placed so that a man may be moved from one to the other, thus making a row at every move.

When you have only four men left you can jump all over the board.
