### DOWN YOU GO

Any number may play DOWN YOU GO, with one player acting as Moderator, the others being members of the panel or, contestants. Optional with the group, one player may be Moderator for the duration of play; or the winner of each game may be the Moderator for the succeeding game.

The Moderator takes a position facing the players, six feet or more in front of them, making sure no member of the panel can see behind the board after it is set up.

The cut-out board is set up by placing it in the slotted blocks which act as a stand, with the colored side facing the players.

The Guide Sheet and Letter Box are placed behind the board, and the letters, when separated, can be kept conveniently alphabetically arranged in the Letter-Box.

The Moderator then picks a phrase from the suggested list or of his own invention, and places each letter of the phrase on the Guide Sheet, skipping a block between words. After completing the phrase on the Guide Sheet, the Moderator then places a blank marker on the holder above the window on the board bearing the same number as the blank space on the Guide Sheet.

If a word cannot be completed on a line, or cannot be properly hyphenated to complete a line, then as many blanks as may be needed to fill out the line are placed in the windows, and the Moderator continues on the next line.

After the phrase is completed the Moderator places two blanks at the end of the phrase, and in addition may indicate the end by saying "This shows the end of the phrase."

When the layout on the Guide Sheet has been completed, the Moderator then gives the clue for the phrase. As can be noted from the samples, the clue is not a direct hint or lead to the phrase. In fact, it is as misleading as the Moderator can make it without being untruthful. It is up to the panel members to try to obtain direct information when they ask their free questions.

After the clue has been given each member of the panel may ask one question which may be answered "Yes" or "No" by the Moderator. NOTE: It is suggested that if there are more than five players in the panel, that only five selected by the Moderator be allowed to ask questions — one to each.

A player may at any time try to guess the complete phrase. However, if he fails to give the complete phrase correctly, word for word, he goes down, and is out of that game. He may not help the remaining players with any suggestions or hints; but must remain silently on the sidelines until the next game begins.

After the questions have been asked, each player in turn as assigned by the Moderator, guesses a letter by saying "Are there any (mentioning the letter)?" If there are any of the letter selected by the player, the Moderator says "There are (stating the quantity of the letter chosen that appear in the phrase)," taking each one from the Guide Sheet, and placing it in the correspondingly numbered window on the board. If there is none of the letter chosen, the Moderator says, "Down You Go," and the player is out for the balance of that game as described above.

The players continue guessing in turn (except when a player thinks he knows the phrase) until someone guesses the phrase, or until all the players are down; at which time the Moderator tells them the phrase, and a new game is started.

In any game, when half the panel is down, the remaining members each get one more free question, after which they continue again guessing the letters or phrase as above.

Punctuation marks, except for hyphens, are completely ignored.
